#### John 2:1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. <sup>2</sup> Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. <sup>3</sup> When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' 5 His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' <sup>6</sup> Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. <sup>7</sup> Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. <sup>8</sup> He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. 9 When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom <sup>10</sup> and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' 11 Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

# **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity**

The week of prayer for Christian unity is 18-25 January. This special week provides an opportunity to focus our prayers on Christian unity, as well as speak about and experience Christian unity personally, in our village, town or county as well as engage with what happens at a national level. This year the theme 'You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbour as yourself' (Lk 10:27) has come from an ecumenical team from Burkina Faso. They have reflected on the familiar story of the Good Samaritan, and all are encouraged to Go and do likewise. #### **PCC News**

The PCC met on Wednesday 17 January and would like to share the following key messages:

- Revd Suzanne remains in hospital and will stay there until she has her operation. She is cheerful and doing well; please keep her and her family in your prayers. It is likely that her recovery will take several months. We have been asking for help from clergy and lay leaders around the deanery and hope to be able to continue with our regular pattern of worship. This will include Revd Stephanie leading our worship on the 4th Sundays of the month.
- We had a long discussion about the large hall roof and the work required. We are committed to repairing the roof and will be applying for grants. We also recognise that we will need significant fundraising in a short timescale we are aiming for the work to be completed by September 2024 and is likely to cost around £50,000. We will be agreeing a fundraising plan at our meeting in three weeks; some ideas that have been suggested include:
  - Winter fuel payment donation do you receive the winter fuel payment from the government? could you donate all or some of it towards the roof work? if so, are you a tax payer and willing to gift aid your donation? This can be done by cheque or bank transfer and letting Kevin, our Treasurer, know.
  - ♦ Fill a Smartie Tube (or Denture Cleaning Tablet Tube) could you fill a tube with £1 coins? Its surprising how much can be collected.
- We agreed our 2023 draft accounts, which will now go to our independent examiner for review, before being finalised ready for the APCM. We overspent our General Fund and our Fabric Fund by c£6,600. Our assets (the money in our bank accounts) reduced from £55,667 to £26,121 by the end of the year.
- We agreed our 2024 budget. We are planning to break-even on our General Fund. We will need to monitor our cash flow carefully.
